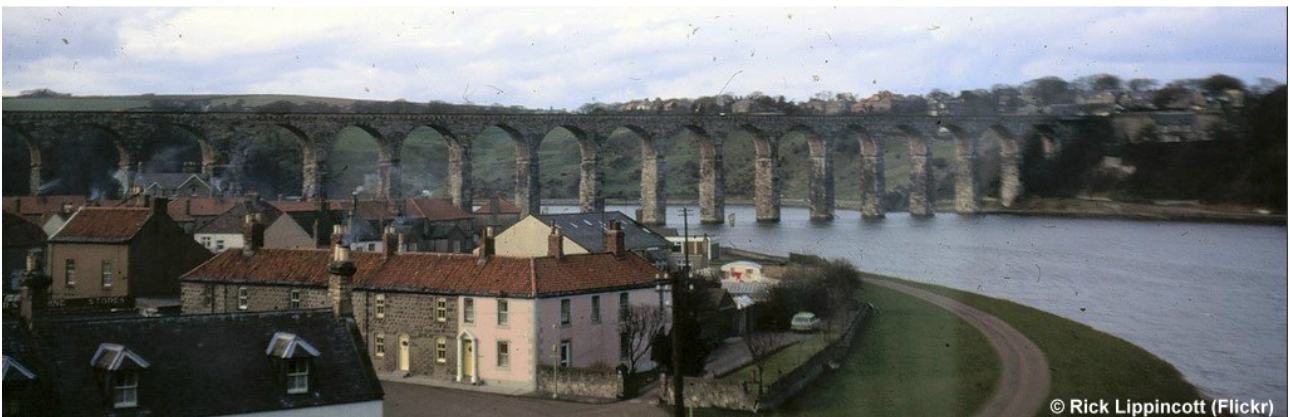

**Berwick-upon-Tweed** iˈbɛrɪk əpən ˈtwiːd] (Scottish Gaelic: Abaruig, Scots: Sooth Berwick) is a town in the county of Northumberland. It is the northernmost town in England. It is located 2½ miles (4 km) south of the Scottish border, at the mouth of the River Tweed on the east coast. It is about 56 miles (90 km) east-south east of Edinburgh, 65 miles (105 km) north of Newcastle upon Tyne & 345 miles (555 km) north of London.

The United Kingdom Census 2011 recorded Berwick's population as 12,043. A civil parish and town council were created in 2008.

Berwick was founded as an Anglo-Saxon settlement during the time of the Kingdom of Northumbria, which was annexed by England in the 10th century. The area was for more than 400 years central to historic border wars between the Kingdoms of England & Scotland, & several times possession of Berwick changed hands between the two kingdoms. The last time it changed hands was when England retook it in 1482. Berwick remains a traditional market town & also has some notable architectural features, in particular its medieval town walls, its Elizabethan ramparts & Britain's earliest barracks buildings

There is so much to see in this part of the world, including Bamburgh castle (under 30 minutes by car), although Berwick-Upon-Tweed has a lot to offer too....

## The Castle Hotel Berwick - on - Tweed

An inside look at The Castle Hotel, Berwick Upon Tweed -

“The Castle Hotel is named because of its close proximity to Berwick Castle, built in the 12th century by King David of Scotland. The ruins of the castle fell victim to the Victorians when they built Berwick Railway Station in 1847 with the platforms running through the centre of the Great Hall. All that remains of the castle today is The White Wall which can be found on the map at location 17. The Castle Hotel started life as a pub named The Cow and Calf run by the Lumsden Family and stood in the area now used as the hotel dining room. Around 1843 the new tenant, Alexander Falconer, is believed to have changed the name of The Cow and Calf to The Castle Inn. The licencing records show the name was again changed in 1909 to The Castle Hotel and it was at this point that the hotel was given the Arts and Crafts look which remains today. The renowned artist L.S. Lowry regularly stayed in the Hotel on his many visits to Berwick where he captured many views of the town. Eric Lomax author of the Railway Man attended the Remembrance Services from here, he will be sadly missed.”
